LOST FOREVER

Basildon Borough Council approve 250 houses, off Laindon Road, adjacent to Frithwood

he view on the front cover could be lost forever following last month's decision by Basildon Borough Council's Planning Committee to approve a planning application for 250 houses on Green Belt land west of Laindon Road running across the rich farmland to Frithwood Lane and ancient Frith Wood.

The primary justification was a dire shortage of new property and a somewhat convenient reclassification of the land as 'grey belt' under very new planning guidance, supported by a recent Green Belt Study, that weakens the protection of much of the land around Billericay. This is clearly a very sad and worrying outcome, potentially setting the scene for what is to come in the future, with several other planning applications awaiting a decision. However, the application is now subject to the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government considering calling-in the application for review and we have started lobbying for that to happen. We would like to thank the several hundred residents that objected to this application, and very specifically those that attended the planning committee meeting and spoke out in public. As always, resident action and involvement is important. We must use our voices.

Maitland Lodge, South Green

Two years ago, an application for 47 houses at Maitland Lodge, Southend Road was approved on appeal by a Planning Inspector whose report included an opinionated mini-rant about the importance of the 45% 'affordable' (albeit unaffordable, being discounted 20%) element of the proposal.

But now the developers are trying to wriggle out of this, reducing the 45% 'affordable' (21 homes) to 15% (7 homes) claiming 'viability' - the government's guarantee that developers are entitled to at least a 20% profit margin.

Again and again we will see the 'affordable' element used as justification to build on Green Belt, with the proportion later reduced after approval is given.

The Lake at Lake Meadows:-

It has been well-demonstrated that the fish and hence other aquatic life have proliferated since the lake was oxygenated. The anglers bear witness to the fact. Nighttime bat life over the lake has also continued to be productive with Daubenton's skimming the surface for the abundant emerging aquatic insect life and the pipistrelles joining in. The oxygenation has reinvigorated the lake's aquatic insect population providing the food chain link that has led to the abundant fish life. Fish eating Cormorants sometimes visit the lake that tells its own story!

Wildfowl and Gulls:-

Prior to their being a series of mild winters, the lake hosted a healthy population of visiting wildfowl and gull species in sometimes impressive numbers; taking refuge from the freezing conditions as the lake represents an inland microclimate. But since we have been experiencing a succession of milder winters the visiting birdlife has diminished. It could be the case that the mildness of the winters has meant that the waterbirds have not had to seek the lake as a refuge.

Several naturalists pointed out, whether coincidence or not, that when the feeding of the wildfowl ceased by the public because of a rodent problem, the wildfowl and gull visitors plummeted dramatically (Although one can feed them grain but on lesser scale).

ou will be aware that The BDRA with our partner group the Billericay Action Group (BAG), has been undertaking a campaign to make residents aware of the Local Plan consultation which was open for comment from the 18th November - the 12th January 2025. This was a big ask due to the short notice we received, for the date of the consultation.

Once the leaflets were finalised and printed, we needed volunteers to help with the distribution. Many of our road reps came forward and volunteered to post leaflets to non-member houses on their rounds and take up extra volunteering roles and other volunteers came forward as word spread through the Save Billericay from Housing Development Facebook page. Overall, we have delivered and handed out over 12k leaflets, a huge undertaking. We have been at the Christmas market, in the rain, stood outside the station in the freezing cold, leafletted the





parkrun, attended the Evening Echo protest at Coniston, attended a Billericay Football match, given out leaflets at the Chancery LP consultation meeting and generally spread the word at meetings and clubs we attended. Thank you to Little Burstead Parish Council, who liaised with us on the distribution of leaflets and posters to attendees at their meeting to discuss the Local Plan. We believe that through our magazine and the leaflet we have reached 99.9% of Billericay residents. Thank you to Askin, who organised two events in The Reading Rooms to help those

residents who wanted to comment on the plan but where thwarted by the technology and lastly but certainly not least, thank you to the BAG members who have done a tireless job in keeping us informed via the 'Save Billericay from Housing Development' Facebook page', to enable us to complete the Local Plan consultation.

I hope I haven't missed anyone out, you all know who you are. After all that volunteering I hope you found the time to comment on the Local Plan yourselves! Well done to you all, we couldn't have done it without you.

Closure of South Green GP surgery

The BDRA contacted Councillor Schrader relating to concerns re the closure of South Green GP's surgery. His response is shown below.

Thank you for getting in touch. I can confirm that all the Billericay Councillors have been made aware of the proposed closure of the South Green Surgery on Grange Road, and the merger with The New Surgery on Stock Road.

Residents are collecting signatures for a petition, and I have assisted them by setting up a Change.org online petition, 'Save South Green GP Surgery' https://www.change.org/p/savesouth-green-gp-surgery.

I attended the patient engagement meeting at South Green Memorial Hall yesterday evening, which was well attended. Our Member of Parliament, the Rt. Hon. Richard Holden, M.P., raised the matter in Parliament with the Health Secretary and I know he has also arranged a meeting with the Mid & South Essex Integrated Care Board. The South Green Surgery is in a difficult position, as the landlord has served notice, which gives them little choice but to close. Under the circumstances, the option of merging with The New Surgery would appear preferable to the only other alternative, which would be what the ICB calls a 'managed dispersal' of the surgery's patients. I do not think that would be in the best interests of the surgery's patients, and the merger will allow for continuity of care. But I think it is generally recognised by everyone that the whole situation is profoundly less than ideal. I have grave concerns about capacity issues but, more importantly, The New Surgery is more than a mile and a half away from South Green and will leave that community effectively with no local GP services.

The priority now must be to try and work with the ICB to identify a new site in the Great Burstead and South Green area from which a local surgery could operate in the future. In the meantime, however, it seems unlikely that a new situation will be found before the surgery closes in March of next year. We shall really have to hold people's feet to fire to ensure that this service is ultimately re-provided in Great Burstead and South Green.

Anything the BDRA can do to help promote the petition and raise awareness will, I am sure, be greatly appreciated by the affected residents.



MEET YOUR NEW POST MASTER

ave you visited the new Post Office in the High Street? King Kanagasundaram our new Post Master opened the new Post Office on the 4th November 2025, to great fanfare, with our MP Richard Holden, Basildon Borough and Town Councillors and the Basildon Mayor all present to celebrate the opening of our new Post Office, at 103c High Street.



King came to this country from Sri Lanka in 1989 to escape the Civil War, following his elder brother Prince, who came to study in this country. If you are wondering about those names; King's parents being Christian and keen royalists gave all their children regal names. Roal, Prince, Duke, Countess and Queen, as well as King. He met his wife, a teacher, in England, and they married in 1998.

They have two children, Noah a Lawyer and Faith a Junior Doctor. He started his career as a petrol pump cashier, moved on to be a Post Office cashier, and then saw the opportunity to be his own boss as Post Master in 1999. Since then, for the last 25 years he has operated Post Offices in Essex and Suffolk, and still retains Post Offices in Holland on Sea and Collier Row along with Billericay. The Team at Billericay is made up of King, his brother Duke, and to keep the regal theme going, Lord Robert, also known as Geoff! Heather, who has transferred from the One Shop Post Office completes the team.

King currently lives in Clacton-on-Sea and is undertaking the A12 commute every day but intends moving to Billericay later this year. He served as a Councillor for Tendring District Council for 16 years and only gave up in 2023 when the move to Billericay looked likely. Billericay is lucky as he has not given up on his civic aspirations and intends putting himself forward as a Councillor in Billericay either for the borough or Town Council. He is even thinking of joining the BDRA Committee.

Opening the Post Office at such a busy time of year has been

hard work, but he has found Billericay residents warm and welcoming. He is very pleased to have retained their High Street Post Office. The Post Office offers all services, banking, bill payment and top ups, Passport Applications (new and renewals and the check and send service} DVLA Photocard Renewal and Vehicle Tax, Foreign Currency, Travel Insurance and Travel Money Cards

Any years ago, local people experienced some really hard winters, but these days the climate has changed, and it is rare to even get snow, let alone a hard frost. Between 1600 and 1814, there were seven severe frosts, when the Thames froze over for up to two months at a time and Frost Fairs were held on the ice, with skaters selling their wares and holding bonfires.

In the 1800s, many winters also caused rivers and lakes to be frozen, but for shorter periods. The Great Blizzard of January 17th to 20th 1881, brought huge snow falls across the whole country, with the thermometer showing 22 degrees of frost. There was a tremendous gale and huge drifts in which horses and carts got stuck. The snow had piled up as high as the top of the hedges and was hard enough to walk on at that height. Two men were sent by their master to Billericay with a cart and two horses to fetch some grain, but on the way back were caught in the snowsform and got stuck in a drift in Back Lane. It took them three or four hours to get the horses out and the cart remained where it was for three weeks.

People like Major Spitty enjoyed holding skating parties on their lakes. On January 18th 1908, there was a report in the Essex Newsman of skating in many parts of the county including 'many skaters on the lake at Billericay, part of the late Major Spitty's estate'. Curling was also played on the ice there – a pastime probably brought by the Scottish farmers, who came down to farm in Essex in the 1880s.

There were several incidents on the ice on the lake at Lake Meadows last century and lives were sadly lost. Whilst it may be tempting to think it is safe to walk on the frozen lake people, especially youngsters, need to know that stepping out onto the ice can be extremely dangerous and potentially fatal. Not only are these individuals placing themselves in perilous danger, they are also risking the safety of those who come to their aid, if they get into difficulty.

We have not had a severely cold winter here since 1982 when some of us can remember quite deep snow in the days leading up to Christmas. The weather will certainly bring rain in the coming weeks, but hopefully there will be no more snow or severe frosts this winter.

If it isn't snowy, our volunteers will start gardening again in the next couple of weeks. If anyone would like to join us, they will be most welcome, just bring gardening gloves and wear sensible footwear; we have plenty of tools. We hope to see you at the park any Tuesday morning from 9.30am.

We are pleased to see that the café has reopened under new management and we wish Mike and his team all the best in his new venture.

Grounds for challenging a will: What you need to know

t is possible to contest a will if it appears to be invalid or fails to make reasonable financial provision for an eligible applicant.

If a will is successfully contested and found invalid, it will be set aside, and the estate will be distributed under the previous will (if one exists) or under Intestacy Rules (if no previous will exists). The court can vary the will and make financial adjustments where appropriate if the will is valid.

Challenging a will can be particularly significant in cases involving substantial estates or complex financial arrangements. A claimant must have legal grounds to successfully challenge a will. The most common arounds include:

- Lack of capacity The testator did not have the mental capacity to make a will.
- Lack of knowledge and **approval** - The testator was not aware of the contents of their will.
- Want of due execution The will was not executed properly.
- Undue influence The testator was coerced into making the will by someone else.



MATTERS

- Fraudulent calumny Someone poisoned the testator's mind against an individual who would naturally inherit, leading to that person being disinherited.
- Fraud or forgery The will was forged by someone else.
- Rectification The will does not reflect the deceased's wishes due to a clerical error or a failure to understand the deceased's instructions when the will was prepared.
- Inheritance (Provision for Family and Dependants) Act 1975 - The will fails to make reasonable financial provision for an eligible applicant under the Act.

A claim under these grounds requires evidence, often focusing on what happened when the will was made, which can be difficult to obtain.

If you believe there may be grounds to challenge a will, seek expert legal advice early to protect your interests.

A Christmas Day lunch for those who are on their own is planned each year and part-funded by 'Churches Together in Billericay' (CTB). Each year one of the Billericay churches hosts the event and it is organised by one or two members of the churches together with an army of volunteers from the community. This year it was decided to hold the event at Emmanuel Church, Laindon Road, and the first task was to reach out for donations to fully fund the event, followed by finding volunteers for the day. In the usual great Billericay community spirit, after many weeks of planning there was a huge turnout of 28 volunteers (including children) on Christmas Eve who arrived at Emmanuel to help set up the party. Tables and the hall were decorated and the kitchen organised ready for the big day. Everyone worked together and got the tasks done.



The exquisite table centre pieces were kindly donated by two local florists. JBs Florist and Flourishing Flowers. The Shepherd & Dog pub and the Burstead Golf Club kindly donated the majority of the meals, all cooked by their amazing team of chefs. Christmas morning saw volunteers collecting the food and bringing it back to the Emmanuel Church. This meant, the kitchen team who usually cook all the meals, had a much easier time. The generosity provided by these two businesses was outstanding. We also received a large donation of frozen food from the Cook Shop which meant the Christmas dinner was complete.

In total, 49 volunteers, including a 1 year old, and several other children, assisted throughout the day. The volunteer drivers went out to collect the guests and during the day more volunteers arrived to welcome guests, seat them, and begin the wonderful festivities. As the 75 guests arrived for 1 p.m., they were welcomed with Bucks Fizz, kindly donated by Cellars. They were greeted by the music of a stunning violinist, who volunteered her time, and performed Christmas music. All soft beverages on the day were donated by Steve Nightingale at Britvic. At 1.15 p.m. members of Billericay Round Table arrived to give a food box to each guest to enjoy on Christmas evening or Boxing Day. In the boxes were cheese and biscuits, chutney, mince pies and more. It was a delight to see two charities work together. At 1.30 p.m., a live singer, who also volunteered his time, sang Frank Sinatra songs whilst the guests ate their lunch. The church hall was alive with chatting, happy faces and music. Once all the lunches had been served, everyone came together to say a big 'thank you' to every person who volunteered and those who donated. For two minutes it was time to think about others and be together as one big family. Next came dessert, much of which had been donated by Waitrose. Christmas pudding, trifle, lemon, tart, mince pies, and brownies arrived from the kitchen, along with hot drinks.

A quiz took place at 3 p.m. followed by the King's Speech after which time the event came to an end. As guests began to leave, they were each handed a Christmas gift, kindly donated by parents of the Mini Athletics South West Essex group. Volunteer drivers arrived to take guests home safely, whilst other volunteers helped to clear up. However, on Boxing Day another 20 volunteers returned to properly clean the hall, put back the kitchen in order, and take all the rubbish home.

Along with the donations received above, CTB also received financial donations from Cardinal Maritime, the Reading Rooms, Co-op, and the Billericay District Residents Association, which all together paid for the event. Local members of the community who saw the adverts also donated items.

Christmas is for spreading joy, kindness, and bringing people together. This wonderful event which Churches Together in Billericay helps to organise each year, shows what a great community of local people and businesses we have in Billericay. We look forward to the next Christmas meal in 2025, and hope to reach even more people who might otherwise spend Christmas alone.
